Cedarville bookstore to close its doors

CEDARVILLE — Sherman Mackereth has run The Christian Nook book and variety store for 12 years and he hasn't worked a day

"I play all day long," Mackereth said. "I've never had a job that was work to me. I refuse to have a job that's work to me."

At the end of May, Mackereth's work with The Christian Nook, which sells used Christian books and other miscellaneous items, will come to an end. The shop's last day is May 25. Mackereth says the shop's not doing well and because of the upcoming costs of paying for Obamacare, he says he can't afford both health care and the store.

"Then, the other reason: my children are the only reason I live here in Cedarville," Mackereth said. "And they're going to be moving in a couple of years anyways, so I

Furlough to affect more than base employees

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE — The 13,000 civilian employees at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base are expected to receive furlough notices around June 5 to allow for implementation on July 8.

Secretary of Defense Chuck Nagel announced a time-line for civilian furloughs Tuesday, reducing the number of days off from 14 to 11. Furlough days will begin July 8 and will be for one day a week.

"This is good news for our civilian employees here at Wright-Patterson AFB. It is unfortunate that we must do furloughs, but it is an improvement that DoD was able to reduce the number to 11 from the original 22," 88th Air Base Wing and Installation Commander Col. Cassie Barlow said Tuesday.

The DOD notified Congress in February that it planned to furlough civilian workers for up to 22 days by the end of the fiscal


Those who attend "always leave with a smile on their face," said former Mayor John Saraga. "We don't judge. We just try our best to provide a good meal. That's what this is about."

food or cash to help the program continue.

"We have partnered with so many area churches and area organizations — a whole bunch of great people," he said. "But our budget, like everybody else, is tough and tight.'

Churches such as St. Brigid, Xenia Nazarene and others, along with organizations like Rotary and Altrusa have helped The Caring Place over the years, Saraga said. Tudor's Biscuit World donated the food for last week's meal.

He also wants to let those in the community who aren't aware of The Caring Place, know they are welcome to come on Thursday nights

The Caring Place volunteers help serve food to those at the meal. Eight volunteers are needed per night to help serve, Saraga said. Youth from Greene County Juvenile Court come set up the tables for community service.

The church basement is where the food is prepared and served from a kitchen that has four ovens, two fridges, a dishwasher and pantry.

There are 12 dates that need volunteers to help through 2013.

"It's neighbor helping neighbor," Saraga said. "That's what this is about."

year on Sept. 30. In March, that number was reduced to 14. These furloughs come as a result of the nearly \$40 billion in automatic 2013 defense budget cuts known as sequestration.

The 13,000 civilian employees that make up approximately 60 percent of the workforce at Wright-Patt are facing a salary reduction 20 percent over the 11-week period. Fewer than 100 employees at WPAFB, including medics and firefighters, will be exempted from the furloughs.

"These have always been a measure of last resort as indicated by the reduction in the number of furloughs. As we move forward, we will continue to offer every assistance to our employees through community

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and information fairs," said Barlow

The base commander says the furlough will create a loss of \$55 million for the local economy as well. Residents, business owners and restaurants in Fairborn believe 11 furlough days will still have an impact on their finances.

"I was a little dissatisfied with the whole thing," said Sharmayne Thrower, who just retired from Wright-Patt. "I think there are a lot of people who are having trouble making it right now with the economy the way it is."

Tickets Pub and Eatery in downtown Fairborn believes it too will be impacted.

"It's really sad that they have to go through this," said Cheryl Abbitt, who works at Tickets.

thought this was a good time

to get out." In preparing to close the shop, Mackereth is offering

75 percent off everything in the shop. According to Mackereth, if people had come in to the shop before the sale like they have since, he wouldn't have to worry about money.

"But unfortunately, Cedarville is not the place I thought it would be for selling good, sound Christian books which is sad," he said.

Mackereth said he has had some regulars, although he says most of them are from out of town.

"In fact, because of the regulars I've had, I've given them even a more special deal than the 75 percent off," he

Mackereth came to Cedarville 12 years ago from Ithaca, N.Y., because of family in the area. In New York, Mackereth says he had operated a Christian bookstore out of the basement of his home. Also, when he moved to New York City as a tentmaker Christian missionary – a missionary that supports himself he vended books on the

streets for a year. "I've had a little bit of experience and have seriously researched Christian bookstores and stuff," Mackereth said. "So I knew what I was getting into."

Mackereth says he opened The Christian Nook a month after he moved to the village.

"I had to get this building in shape," he said of the little white and red brick shop on Main Street in downtown Cedarville. "It was a mess. It was a woodshop in the back and a quilt shop in the front. It took me the whole month just to get all the wood dust out of here."

The floor and ceiling also needed work, and Mackereth painted part of the bricks outside.

"I don't believe in painting bricks, but it was already painted, and so I painted it a little nicer color than it was," he says.

What Mackereth will miss about running the bookstore is just that: running the bookstore. "Being here," Mackereth said, "Enjoying the

people that do come in and enjoying putting the books on the shelves and listing them on the computer and all that is involved in running a bookstore."

Though Mackereth may not be running The Christian Nook after May 25, he's not done working.

"I'm moving to Bradenton, Fla., where I'll live in a Christian village and I plan on getting a job," he said.

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
